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ASABE REVISES CLASSIFICATION CODE FOR FARM AND AGRICULTURAL INJURIES

ST JOSEPH, MICHIGAN— The American Society of Agricultural and Biological Engineers (ASABE) has revised its standard for classifying farm and agricultural injuries.

The revision, ASAE S575.3 MAY2020, Farm and Agricultural Injury Classification (FAIC) Code, provides a more modern and consistent means of classification to individuals assigning codes, regardless of their knowledge of agricultural operations.

The standard is applicable to all farm-, ranch-, and agriculturally related injuries involving any of a wide range of hazards, such as machinery, vehicles, animals, plants, structures, equipment, tools, dusts, chemicals, weather, environment, and products associated with production agriculture.
